How can games unlock a rich world of learning? This is the big question at the heart of the growing 'games and learning' movement that's gaining momentum in education. The Guide to Digital Games and Learning explains key ideas in game-based learning, pedagogy, implementation, and assessment. This guide makes sense of the available research, and provides suggestions for practical use.

The Guide to Digital Games and Learning started as a series of blog posts written by Jordan Shapiro with support from the Joan Ganz Cooney Center at Sesame Workshop and the Games and Learning Publishing Council. We've brought together what we felt would be the most relevant highlights of Jordan's posts. We wanted to create a dynamic, in-depth guide that answers many of the most pressing questions that educators, parents, and life-long learners have raised – questions around using digital games for learning. While we had educators in mind when developing this guide, any lifelong learner can use it to develop a sense of how to navigate the games space in an informed and meaningful way.



We urge you to read it. Start with the introduction that provides an overview of games in the classroom. Then go straight to the second section which presents the way in which the research around digital games is evolving and talks about how pediatricians, academics, educators, and researchers are working to find answers to how games and technology affect learners of all ages. The third section, on 'How to Start Using Digital Games for Learning', provides examples of how some educators are using digital games in the classroom and how they find support when running into difficulties. The next section, 'How to Choose a Digital Learning Game', gives you a starting point for game selection by providing an understanding of the types of games available in the marketplace and how to go about selecting them. Ideas about how to overcome obstacles for using digital games in the classroom are presented in the next section and, finally, the last section takes an in-depth look at how some teachers are using games in the classroom and their real-life struggles and victories.

Automated Teller Machines



ATMs are absolutely everywhere nowadays; people use these cash machines without a second thought. The possibility that something could go wrong has never crossed most people's minds.

Unfortunately, nowadays, things are not always as they seem at the ATM. Most ATM scams involve criminal theft of debit card numbers and personal identification numbers (PINs) from the innocent users of these machines. ATM theft usually involves the innocent cooperation of the cardholders themselves.

The first step in avoiding these traps is to understand them. Let's look at the most common ways people get robbed at ATMs.

One trick involves sticking a false façade over the ATM machine. Though the machine looks normal, in reality this façade will 'eat' your card and then show you an error message on the screen. Your PIN is usually recorded by a hidden camera, or in some cases, by a 'helpful' person standing nearby who suggests that you try to enter your PIN again. Of course, this person is actually a criminal, and moments after you leave, he or she will take your card from the false front of the ATM and walk away with both your card and the access code. All this applies to ATMs in areas such as airport terminals and self-service petrol stations.

INTERNET SAFETY ON MOBILE PHONES

Remember why you first agreed to get your child a mobile? Apart from their nagging, safety probably had something to do with it – you could check on them: where they were and what they were up to.

Mobiles come with new things for parents to worry about –namely, internet safety, theft, bullying and who your kids are chatting to without supervision (never mind why their phone runs out of credit faster than you can top it up and always goes to voicemail when you really need to talk to them).

Mobile phones: parents' checklist

First off, you need to decide whether you want your child to use 'Pay As You Go' or you'd rather sign up for a contract so that you receive an itemised monthly bill. The latter may well be a better option for younger children.

Most importantly:

Make sure you know the answers to the following questions:

Does the phone have internet access?

All European mobile phone companies have to provide an internet filter on their phones to help block potentially harmful stuff like pornography. But (and this is the important bit for parents) most operators don't activate the filter unless you ask them to.

Is Bluetooth enabled?

Bluetooth enables your child's mobile phone to find and talk to other Bluetooth-enabled mobile phones in the vicinity. If it's activated, it means your child could receive unexpected and unwanted messages, and any personal information stored on your child's phone –for example, their contact list-could be vulnerable. Switching off the Bluetooth option makes the phone 'invisible' to other Bluetooth users.

Is the phone registered for a child or adult user?

If the phone is registered to a child user, it will automatically not be able to access content rated 18+. But if your child has a phone that has been passed down to them from you or another adult, no such block will be in place. Brave the piped music and endless wait and talk to your mobile phone operator to find out if the internet filter is activated.

Can the phone access chat-rooms or games where users chat to one another?

Are these moderated? Chat-rooms provided by your child's mobile operator or its partners which do not have 18+ age-restrictions must be moderated. Find out about the operator's moderation policies and systems. Be aware that chat-rooms accessed on the internet via your child's mobile (i.e., which are not provided by the mobile operator or its partners) may not be moderated.



Is 'location services' switched off?

With your teenagers, stress to them that if they use a location service alongside their social networking profile, e.g. Facebook, everyone on their 'friends' list will know where they are at any time, so that they have to be 100% certain they only allow 'real' friends who they know and trust to locate them.

Does your child know that they should never give out their mobile number to strangers?

Our parents told us never to talk to strangers and we in turn need to stress to our children that they mustn't give away any personal information to people they've never met before via their mobile and the internet.

Through the double doors at Birstall Playgroup you enter a world of possibility, where no child is limited by their challenges and the sound of children's laughter fills the air. In a room next door to the play area you find tranquility –a peace which is only punctured by the sound of a kettle boiling. This is where we can spend our only two hours of respite for the week. Here we share stories, complete paperwork (bills or taxes for example) or pop off to do the food shopping. For us, this time is just as precious as it is for their little ones. One parent describes Birstall Playgroup as 'equally beneficial'. She says: "I can't even go to the toilet at home as my son needs constant care. Here, I can have a warm cup of coffee and I don't feel so alone."

Staff, parents and the children at Birstall work hard to get to the point where this kind of separation can occur -sometimes it takes up to six months. But often, this can set up the child for mainstream school, which isn't always on the cards before. Since three-year-old Riley has been attending the group, for instance, he's learnt to speak, started to read and can sing. All of this means that Riley will be able to go mainstream school.


